#### **INSTRUCTOR BIO**

**SARA DI VITTORIO** is an Assistant General Counsel and the Public Records Officer for Snohomish County Public Utility District #1. In this position, she processes public records requests and advises PUD departments on Public Records Act compliance. She is one of the Governor's appointees to the Public Records Exemption Accountability Committee (the "Sunshine Committee"). Sara also provides regular training to local jurisdictions and professional organizations around the state on the PRA and GR 31.1.

Prior to joining the PUD, Sara worked as the Civil Deputy Prosecuting Attorney for Snohomish County. In that position, Sara handled all public records litigation involving Snohomish County and provided advice to Snohomish County's departments on all aspects of records retention and public records disclosure. Prior to that position, Sara worked as an Assistant Attorney General for nine years including seven years in the Corrections Division. At the AGO, Sara was a primary legal advisor to and litigator for the Department of Corrections on public records and federal civil rights issues.

Sara received both her B.A. and her J.D. from the University of Washington.
